Stevens to Lead Trenton Football

Former Bulldog brings hometown roots, new systems to 2026-27 season.

For Scott Stevens, becoming Trenton High School's head football coach is more than the next step in his coaching career—it's the fulfillment of a dream that began years ago on the sidelines in C.F. Russell Stadium.

A 2008 Trenton High School graduate, Stevens returns to his alma mater after building experience as a teacher, coach and administrator. He's bringing with him a new vision for the Bulldogs while embracing the traditions that first inspired him to coach.

What is the biggest issue facing the circuit clerk and ex officio recorder of deeds office, and how, if elected, will you work to resolve it?

Spencer: "The biggest challenge is balancing efficient public service with accurate, secure record-keeping. If elected, I will improve office efficiency, strengthen customer service, support responsible technology upgrades and ensure court and land records remain accurate, accessible and protected while serving everyone with professionalism, integrity and accountability."

Vandevender: "The biggest challenge is modernizing operations while preserving essential records. I will strengthen cross-training and staff consolidation, expand secure online access to recorder records and prioritize preserving historic documents through reliable digital backup systems. These improvements will increase efficiency, accessibility and long-term protection of Grundy County's public records."

What do you believe is the most important responsibility of the circuit clerk and ex officio recorder of deeds?

Spencer: "The most important responsibility is maintaining accurate, secure court and land records while providing efficient, professional service to the public. The office must operate with honesty and transparency to ensure each person is treated fairly and every record is protected."

Vandevender: "The circuit clerk and ex officio recorder safeguards the integrity of court and public records, supports judges in the administration of justice, ensures accurate and accessible records and provides efficient, professional service. Strong leadership, accountability and public trust are essential to serving the courts and

the citizens of Grundy County."

Please explain what you view as the most important responsibility of this elected office given the role this office plays in the community.

Spencer: "The circuit clerk and ex officio recorder's office safeguards court and land records, supports the judicial system and serves the public. Its most important responsibility is ensuring records remain accurate, secure and accessible while providing efficient, professional service that promotes transparency, accountability and public trust."

Vandevender: "This office is the connection between the courts and the public. It supports judges, attorneys, law enforcement and citizens while safeguarding important records. The office should provide compassionate customer service, strong leadership and dependable operations that reflect professionalism, integrity and respect for everyone."

Educational background, including any degrees earned: Spencer graduated from Trenton High School and earned an Associate of Arts degree from North Central Missouri College in 1998. She has also completed numerous in-person and online training courses related to her work.

"I knew in high school that I wanted to be a teacher and a coach," Stevens said. "Growing up, this was always a dream of mine to be the head football coach here in at Trenton."

Stevens credits a former Trenton coach as one of the biggest influences on his career.

"I had a great coach when I was in high school," Stevens said. "Coach (Wes) Croy was a guy I really looked up to, and that's really what I try to be as a coach."

After graduating from Trenton, Stevens attended Truman State University, where he played football while earning a bachelor's and a master's degree. He later completed a specialist degree in educational leadership.

His coaching career began at Schuylar County before he returned to Trenton for three years as a teacher, football coach and track coach. During his final season with the Bulldogs, he served as defensive coordinator before accepting the head coaching position at Brookfield, where he spent four seasons.

For the past five years, Stevens has served as Brookfield High School's assistant principal, athletic director and food service director.

When the Trenton position became available, the timing felt right.

"This is home," Stevens said. "My parents still live here, my brothers live here, and our kids are at a good age. If we were going to make a move, now was the time."

Stevens said returning also allows him to spend more time with his family after balancing multiple

administrative responsibilities.

"We were making that move with the idea that our kids are little," Stevens said. "We want them to have the same kind of experience we had growing up. Hopefully this is the place where we retire and stay."

While winning remain important, Stevens said his definition of success reaches far beyond the scoreboard.

"As a high school coach, your biggest goal should be building young men," Stevens said. "You're teaching them what it means to be a hard worker, what it means to face adversity and what it means to be a great person. If you can teach those things the right way, the wins will come with it."

Stevens also praised former head coach Kevin Hixson for the foundation already in place.

"I'm very lucky stepping into this situation," Stevens said. "Coach Hixson did a great job with this program. The leadership we have with this senior class says a lot about the work that's already

been done. It's made this transition much easier."

Although Trenton is learning an entirely new offense and defense, Stevens said the players have embraced the challenge throughout summer workouts.

"Our goal is to get better every single week," Stevens said. "Everything is new, so there will be a learning period, but these guys are working their tails off and they've really responded."

Assistant coach Jon Guthrie has already seen Stevens' impact.

"Coach Stevens has done a really good job," Guthrie said. "He brings a lot of energy to practice, keeps us organized and has done a great job bringing that defensive mindset with aggressive linebackers and a physical defensive line. He's bringing really good energy to the program."

That enthusiasm has also been noticed by the players.

"It's been really good with Coach Stevens so far," senior Matthew Kralchek said. "He brings really good energy to practices. I think

he's really changing everything here and making it a lot better."

Senior Camden Skipper said the team has embraced the changes despite learning new systems on both sides of the ball.

"It's been a great experience so far," Skipper said. "He's wanting to put a lot of new stuff in and change the culture here. I think we're picking up everything really well."

Skipper said one of the team's strengths has been its willingness to adapt.

"We know the task at hand," he said. "Brand new offense, new defense, new coaches — so we're doing a great job adjusting to all of that and being really open to anything new they're wanting to coach us on."

Stevens believes leadership within the senior class has helped make that adjustment possible.

"I think we have a group of guys that really care about each other," Stevens said. "They don't care who gets the credit. They just want to be part of something great and leave a legacy here at Trenton High School."

The Bulldogs will open the season with non-conference games against East Buchanan and Fayette before beginning Grand River Conference play in Week 3. Stevens said those first two games will help the team establish its identity before conference competition begins.

As excitement builds around the program, Stevens hopes the community will continue supporting the Bulldogs from the stands.

"C.F. Russell is a very unique place," the head coach said. "When that place is loud, it's special. The biggest thing the community can do is show up on Friday nights, cheer these kids on and be positive."

Grand River Garden Club Learns About Popular Garden Flowers

Dorothy Taul and Linda Lamp presented a program on lantana, passion fruit and hollyhocks when the Grand River Garden Club met July 21 at the Galt Café.

Hollyhocks are classic cottage garden flowers known for their tall, dramatic spikes of colorful blooms. The short-lived perennials require six to eight hours of direct sunlight each day to produce strong stems and maximum blooms.

Hollyhocks prefer rich, moist and well-drained soil, reports gardening experts. They can tolerate poor soil, but do not grow well in soggy conditions. Planting them near a fence, wall or other structure can help protect the tall flower spikes from strong winds.

The plants should be watered deeply at their base once or twice a week. A balanced, slow-release fertilizer can be applied in early spring, or the soil can be

top-dressed with compost to encourage healthy growth. Taller varieties may need to be tied to stakes for support. Cutting spent flower spikes down to the base may encourage a second round of blooms, says experts.

Lantana also requires full sun, with at least six to eight hours of direct sunlight daily. The plant prefers loose, well-drained soil but can tolerate poor soil conditions. It grows best in slightly acidic soil with a pH between 6.0 and 6.5.

Lantana grows as a hardy perennial in warm climates in U.S. Department of Agriculture zones 8 through 11. Gardeners in colder climates typically grow it as an annual. Containers and hanging baskets should have adequate drainage holes. Because nutrients can quickly wash out of potting soil, container-grown lantana should be fed monthly

during the summer with a gentle, half-strength balanced liquid fertilizer.

Taul also reported that the Thompson House group is working on fall planting selections.

Elks Lodge Focuses on Community Service, Veterans & Youth Programs

For many people driving past the Trenton Elks Lodge, the building is simply another stop along the street. But inside the historic structure at Five Points, members say the organization is much more than a social gathering place — it is a community-focused nonprofit dedicated to supporting veterans, youth and local charitable causes.

Founded in Trenton on Aug. 14, 1902, the local Elks Lodge will celebrate its 125th anniversary next year. The current lodge building, constructed in 1916 on the site of a former livery stable, has served as the organization's home for more than a century.

Leading the lodge today is Exalted Ruler Scott Hughson, who joined the organization four years ago looking for a place to meet people.

"I honestly joined just to have a place to hang out," Hughson said. "I didn't have kids. I wasn't married at the time. Then I started learning more about what the lodge does and I became more involved."

Today, that involvement centers on charitable giving and volunteer service.

The lodge recently held a barbecue fundraiser during Trenton's Fourth of July festivities, raising more than \$2,000. Members added another \$1,500 from lodge funds, allowing them to donate \$3,500 to the North 65 Senior Center.

"We're constantly donating," Hughson said.

During the past year, the Trenton

Elks have donated \$1,200 to help local FCCLA students attend national competition, \$1,500 to the food pantry, \$500 to FosterAdopt Connect, \$4,000 toward renovations at the Children's Education Center, \$1,000 to the Trenton High School Band Boosters for the Washington, D.C., parade trip and additional support for FFA, senior celebrations, the North Central Missouri Fair and other community organizations.

"We host events and cookouts," Hughson said. "After our expenses are paid, everything above that goes toward our donations."

Elks have also sponsored free community swim nights at the Trenton Family Aquatic Center, providing free admission along with pizza and drinks for families.

The Trenton lodge currently has 228 members, with roughly half remaining active on a regular basis. Membership is by invitation and sponsorship from existing members, a requirement Hughson said helps the organization maintain its nonprofit fraternal status. Applicants must be proposed by one member and endorsed by two additional members before being considered.

While the local lodge focuses on community service, it is also part of a much larger organization.

The Missouri Elks Association helps fund mobile dental clinics that provide care for children with disabilities and disabled veterans throughout the state. Nationally, Elks membership dues support scholarships, grants and youth programs.

Locally, the lodge organizes annual Hoop Shoot and Soccer Shoot competitions that allow area youth to advance from local competition to district, state, regional and

national events. The lodge also helps families with travel expenses as participants advance through each level.

Members say those youth activities are among the most rewarding parts of the organization.

"You get a certain satisfaction when you're helping somebody else, especially when you're helping youth or veterans," Esteemed Leading Knight Matt Robert said. "When you see a kid's face light up during the Hoop Shoot or Soccer Shoot, it just makes it worth it."

Although many residents may think of the Elks Lodge simply as a private club, members hope people recognize the charitable mission behind the organization.

"A lot of people drive by this place and just see a bar," Hughson said. "We're not a bar. We're a lodge. We're a group of people with a common mission, and our goal is to help the community wherever we can."

Beyond fundraising, members describe the lodge as an extended family.

"When you come in here, people know your name," Robert said. "They ask how your day is going. If somebody needs help, they know they can call another Elk brother or Elk sister. We're basically a family."

That sense of purpose, lodge members say, is what keeps them involved.

"It's kind of given me a mission," Hughson said. "Instead of just sitting at home, I get to be part of something that's making a difference in the community."

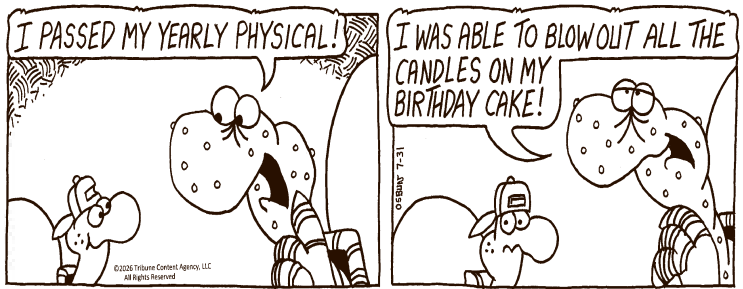

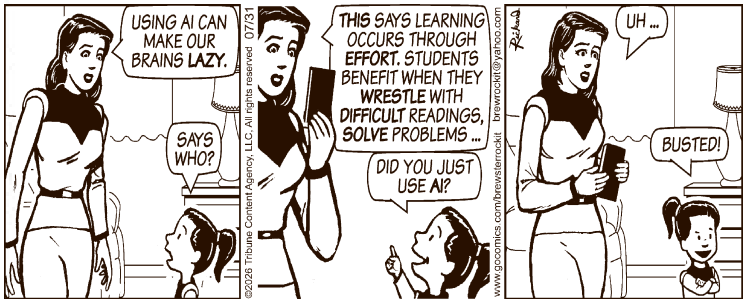
