

Trenton Cross Country Returns After Decades Away

Cross country is back at Trenton High School, with a group of 10 runners preparing to represent the Bulldogs as the program returns for the first time since the 1980s.

"We had a group of seniors that petitioned it and really wanted it," Coach Chris Park said. "There was interest in it, and that's why we got it back in."

The renewed program includes six boys and four girls. Although the runners are entering their first high school cross country season, many already have experience with distance running through track.

Park said that background should help, but the team will still have plenty to learn when it

competes in its first meet Monday, Aug. 31.

"Overall, I think it's going to be eye-opening when we compete because they've never been at a

Trenton Man Faces 2 Child Pornography Possession Charges

A Trenton man is facing two possession of child pornography charges after the highway patrol conducted an investigation into offenders allegedly sharing child porn online.

David B. O'Riordan, 72, is charged with two counts of felony possession of child pornography involving a second or subsequent offense or possession of more than 20 images, according to online court records.

The case was filed July 13 in Grundy County Circuit Court. A warrant was issued that day with no bond allowed, and O'Riordan was taken into custody by the Grundy County Sheriff's Office.

According to the probable cause statement, a search warrant was executed on O'Riordan's computer and other electronic devices and investigators allegedly contained files of child porn.

O'Riordan appeared in court July 14 for his initial appearance. Court records state an initial plea of not guilty was entered. He remained held without bond following the hearing.

A bond hearing was held July 28 after O'Riordan requested

Highway safety law increases penalties for passing school buses

Tim Fuqua remembers clearly his most terrifying moment as a Missouri school bus driver.

Stopping to pick up a smiling autistic third-grade boy, Fuqua noticed an 18-wheeler cresting the hill about 150 yards away. There was no way the truck could stop. All he could do was hope the boy remembered to not cross until he saw Tim's signal. The boy stayed in place and was not harmed, but

Fuqua immediately knew he had to call his boss and change the way the boy was picked up.

Throughout his 15-year career as a bus driver in Savannah and Hannibal, Fuqua has experienced multiple near misses from drivers not paying attention to just blatantly ignoring signs.

As the new school year gets underway, Missouri drivers who pass

kids that run distance in track, so they kind of know the feeling of it. They just don't know the overall terrain of running on grass and running a 5K."

This is also Park's first season coaching cross country. While he has not previously coached the sport, he has spent years around it through his family. His daughter

qualified for state all four years of high school in cross country, and Park said that experience gave him familiarity with the sport before taking over Trenton's new program.

As the Bulldogs build the program from the ground up, the coach said his main focus is not on immediate results, but on making progress throughout the season.

"The overall important thing is just keep improving," he said. "I've always believed that if you keep

improving in any sport you're doing, you're going to get better."

Park said the team has done much of its work early in the morning, practicing from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m.

"It's been hot, but we practice a lot in the morning," the coach said. "That's when we do the majority of our practices because we have some kids that do other sports, and this way they can go to both."

Trenton will compete in seven meets this season, including

a conference meet, but will not host a home meet. Park said spectators can still follow the team on the road, and cross country courses allow fans to move to different points to watch runners throughout the race.

For those unable to travel, Park said encouraging the athletes is another way the community can support the new program.

"I'm really excited with this group because this group works very hard for me," he said.

stopped school buses will face significantly stiffer penalties and potential felony charges under a sweeping new highway safety law aimed at protecting children during their daily commutes.

"I know everyone's trying to get to work in the mornings, but when people disregard the safety of children over their own schedule, it's very frustrating as a driver because as a driver, I'm responsible," Fuqua said. "I'm hauling everyone else's

kids to school and there's no more precious cargo than that. The private citizen, they're always in a hurry and know the frustration of getting behind the school bus. They often try to beat the lights or think you'll hold up and let them go through. But if you're a few seconds too late and someone pulls out and kills somebody, you will have a lot of time to think about it if you get charged for a manslaughter."

The legislation, Senate Bill 1421, drastically escalates the legal and financial consequences for motorists who ignore the flashing red lights and extended stop arms of school buses. First-time violators now face steep fines ranging from \$500 to \$1,000, along with a mandatory five points added to their driver's licenses.

For repeat offenders within a five-year window, the penalties become increasingly severe. A second offense triggers fines up to \$2,000 and an automatic 90-day license suspension. Third and subsequent violations carry a maximum \$3,000 fine and a 180-day suspension, effectively forcing reckless drivers off the road.

Most notably, the law introduces severe criminal upgrades

for incidents resulting in harm. Drivers who strike and injure a child while illegally passing a bus can now be charged with a Class E felony, carrying a penalty of up to four years in prison. If the incident results in serious physical injury or death, the charge escalates to a Class D felony, which carries up to seven years behind bars and a \$10,000 fine.

To aid enforcement, SB 1421 officially authorizes local school districts to equip their bus fleets with external safety cameras. The automated video and photographic evidence captured by these cameras is now fully admissible in court.

The legislation also mandates that courts report all stop-arm convictions to the state within seven days, ensuring that points and suspensions hit driving records without delay.

Safety advocates and school officials have widely praised the measure, calling it a vital deterrent against a persistent and dangerous traffic hazard.

"I remind the kids you're one of one, you cannot be replaced," Fuqua said. "You're one of a kind and your own life is worth taking that extra measure for and we're doing all we can."

a modification of his bond. The prosecuting attorney objected to the request, but the court modified the bond to \$500,000 cash only.

Court records also show O'Riordan applied for services through the Missouri State Public Defender System. At an Aug. 25 hearing, the court determined the defendant did not qualify for public defender services and the was continued to Sept. 8 while O'Riordan seeks legal counsel.

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Trenton Council Approves Code Enforcement Changes, Plans New Animal Control Approach

The City of Trenton plans to move nuisance enforcement away from the police department as part of a restructuring approved by the City Council this week.

Council members approved a job description for a full-time code enforcement officer who would work under Wes Barone and handle nuisance violations while training to assist with building inspections and other duties.

City Administrator Matt Harline said the city previously combined nuisance enforcement and animal control duties within the police department.

The city had already budgeted for a part-time position to assist

Barone, but Harline said combining that funding with money previously used for the animal control position would allow the city to create a full-time position.

Harline said the new employee would be useful immediately because nuisance enforcement requires less training than becoming a building inspector. Over time, the employee could take on additional building and property maintenance inspection duties, he added.

"This person could help out with some of the tasks at the airport," Harline said.

Barone currently handles a combination of airport, zoning, building code and other responsibilities. Harline said having another employee available would keep some of those functions moving when Barone is called away to the airport.

The council also approved changing Barone's title from code enforcement officer and airport manager to community development director.

Harline said the title better reflects Barone's responsibilities for zoning, building codes, the airport and other development-related city functions although the title change does not include a pay increase.

Officials hope to advertise the new code enforcement position

soon, with Harline saying the city could potentially have someone hired by around Oct. 1.

Animal control services would be handled separately.

Harline said the city approached Green Hills Animal Shelter about expanding its role, but the shelter was not interested in taking on additional responsibilities. City officials are now discussing a possible agreement with Affordable Vet Care.

Harline said the cost for a full year of animal control services could be in the range of \$44,000, although no formal agreement has been reached. The figure is based largely on money already associated with animal control staffing, boarding, traps and other related expenses.

Trenton Council Approves Electric, Water Utility Equipment Purchases

The Trenton City Council approved several utility-related purchases this week, including a heat exchanger for an electric generator at the north substation and new pumps for the water treatment plant.

The most extensive discussion centered on a \$21,420 Mueller heat exchanger for Electric Motive Division Unit 2.

Electric Production Supervisor Kyle Sharp said the unit has a ruptured radiator core and has experienced cooling problems.

The city is working toward using a cooling tower and heat exchanger to improve the reliability of the generator rather than depending solely on its locomotive-style radiator.

Ahead of the council approving purchases, councilman Bart Thomas questioned whether repairing the existing radiator would be less expensive.

Thomas said he contacted someone with 32 years of locomotive industry experience who told him individual damaged tubes in some radiators can be closed off while still allowing the system to operate effectively.

"I don't want to see the taxpayers spend all this money if it's not necessary," Thomas said. "If it is, great."

Sharp said repairing the radiator would still require substantial disassembly and would not solve another problem affecting the generators.

He said some units at the north substation pull in heated air discharged by neighboring generators. Units 2 and 4 have been among those experiencing overheating issues.

Sharp said maintaining reliable cooling is important because the city receives financial credits tied to its ability to generate electricity when needed.

City Administrator Matt Harline said the city plans to seek engineering assistance for a broader review of its electric production system and long-term capital needs.

"We don't want to waste any of the taxpayers' money, but we do want to make sure that these engines are functional, because there's a lot of money at stake," Harline said.

The council approved the heat exchanger purchase 5-2, with Thomas and Councilman David Mlika voting against it.

Council members also approved \$17,300 for VIPower to perform polarization index, breaker and relay testing at the north substation.

Sharp said the city initially sought bids but had difficulty finding companies that could perform the complete range of testing required. VIPower could provide the full scope of work.

At the water treatment plant, the council approved a \$40,242.82 bid from Hawkins for new peristaltic metering pumps.

Hawkins submitted the only bid.

Interim Water Supervisor

Gunner Golden said the pumps will replace aging sodium hypochlorite equipment that has become less reliable.

Golden said one of the existing pumps previously seized and had to be rebuilt, with replacement parts taking an extended period to arrive.

The current system uses diaphragm pumps, while the replacements will use peristaltic technology similar to equipment already used elsewhere at the plant.

Golden said the simpler design should also make the pumps easier for city employees to maintain.


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Trenton Girls Golf Looks to Build Around Returning Core

The Trenton High School girls golf team will enter the 2026 season with a young roster, strong team chemistry and a returning core that head coach Travis Mullenix hopes can help the Bulldogs steadily improve throughout the fall.

Last season, Trenton finished 4-6 in dual matches and placed fourth in the Grand River Conference

Tournament. The Bulldogs lost two varsity golfers to graduation in Kinsley Otto and Ali Cox, with Otto earning all-conference honors during her senior season.

Despite those losses, Trenton returns several golfers with varsity experience. Junior Bailey Williams and sophomores Kenlie McCall and Paige Little return to the lineup, while sophomore Adaline Anderson also competed in several varsity matches and tournaments

last season.

This season marks Mullenix's 10th consecutive year leading the Trenton girls golf program. He is also entering his 19th season as Trenton's boys golf coach.

Mullenix said the returning group will be important as the Bulldogs work to replace the experience lost from last year's team.

"We will lean pretty heavily on those three for our team score this year," the coach said of Williams, McCall and Little.

Behind that returning group, Trenton will have several golfers continuing to develop and compete for opportunities throughout the season. Junior Lucy Gottman joins the program with some previous golf experience, while junior Violet Breitenbucher and freshman Anne Lasley are new to the game. Anderson is also expected to take another step after gaining experience last season.

With several players still learning and developing, Mullenix said improvement throughout the season will be an important part of the Bulldogs' approach.

"Golf has a pretty steep learning curve so they will be improving weekly, and I'm looking forward to helping them become better golfers this season," he said.

While Trenton may be young in terms of experience, Mullenix believes the way the golfers work together could help the team as the season progresses.

"We have great team chemistry, and the girls are very supportive of one another," he said. "We'll be a young team with regard to experience, but I have high hopes for this season."

The two early events will give the Bulldogs an opportunity to gain experience and see where the young lineup stands as the team begins working toward the conference and district portions of the season.

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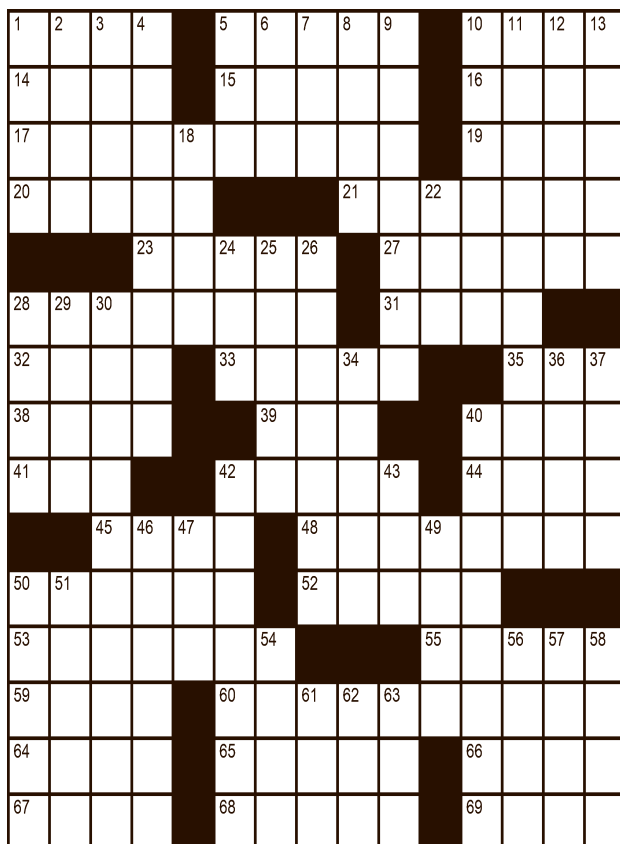
THE Daily Commuter Puzzle by Stella Zawistowski

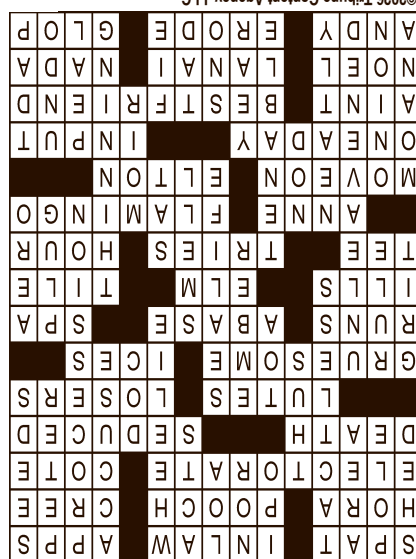

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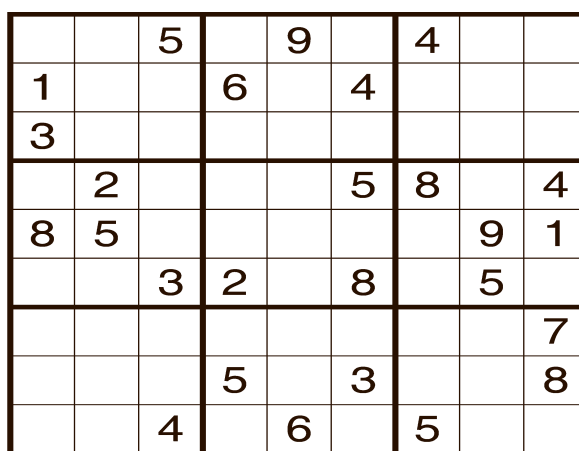
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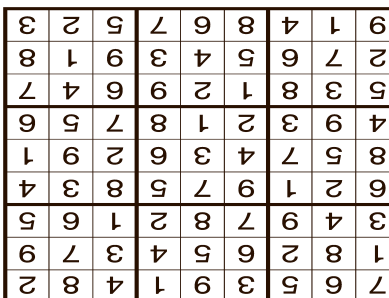

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Trenton Council Sets 2026 Tax Levy

The Trenton City Council approved the city's 2026 property tax levy this week and took the first step toward moving regular council meetings 30 minutes earlier.

Following a public hearing in which no comments were received, the council approved a property tax rate of \$1.1593 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Mayor Jackie Soptic said the rate is calculated using assessed

valuation figures provided to the city by Grundy County.

The ordinance passed 6-1, with Councilman Glen Briggs voting against it. Councilman Marvin Humphreys was absent.

Council members later discussed changing the start time for regular meetings from 7 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Council Member Lindsay Stevens raised the issue, saying an earlier start could make meetings easier for council members, city employees and residents.

"I have children. Getting home late is difficult," Stevens said.

She noted that some city employees finish their normal workday in the afternoon before returning to City Hall for evening meetings.

"I just feel like if it's possible to move that earlier, it might allow even the residents to attend more," Stevens said.

Council members discussed both 6 and 6:30 p.m. as possible starting times.

One complication is the

Building and Nuisance Board, which currently meets at 6 p.m. on the same nights as the City Council. Council members who are also on that board said those meetings are usually completed before 6:30.

The council ultimately voted to have City Administrator Matt Harline prepare an ordinance changing the regular council meeting time to 6:30 p.m. The earlier time will not take effect until the council formally considers and approves the ordinance.

Children from families whose current income is at or below those shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Applications are available at the school office. To apply, fill out a Free and Reduced Price School Meals Family Application and return it to the school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. A complete application is required as a condition of eligibility. A complete application includes: (1) household income from all sources or Food Stamp/TANF case number, (2) names of all household members, and (3) the signature and last four digits of social security number or indication of no social security number of adult household member signing the application. School officials may verify current income or other information provided on the application at any time during the school year.

Foster children may be eligible regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Households with children who are eligible under the foster, Head Start, homeless, migrant, or runaway programs should contact the school for assistance in receiving meal benefits. Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) participants may be eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Children who are members of households currently certified as receiving Food Stamps, TANF or FDIPIR are eligible for free meals. To complete an application, the household must provide the names of the children, a statement that the household receives the qualifying benefits, the Food Stamps/TANF/FDIPIR case number, and the signature of the adult household member making application. When known by the school that members of a household are receiving assistance from Food Stamps, TANF or FDIPIR, households will be notified of their children's eligibility for free school meals. If any children in the household were not listed on the eligibility notice or not listed on the application, the household should contact the school to have benefits extended to all children in the household. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for these benefits.

Under the provisions of the policy, the [Title of Determining Official] will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official, they may wish to discuss the decision with the hearing official on an informal basis or he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to the [Title of Hearing Official]. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the central office where any interested party may review it.

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Grundy County Commission Reviews Bridge Funding, FEMA Projects

The Grundy County Commission discussed bridge funding, FEMA projects, equipment needs and several other county matters during its meeting last week.

Shannon Howe reported that a new call for Missouri Department of Transportation Off-System Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation (BRO) funding had been released. He said the county could continue using its list of potential projects developed several months ago and submit its top two bridge projects if commissioners wanted to maintain those priorities.

Howe also reviewed the county's available soft-match funding and reported there should be enough to cover the BRO projects if they are selected for funding.

Commissioners also discussed budgeting for a cost-share project, with the county's portion estimated at approximately \$1.1 million.

Road and bridge employee Jason Hunter reported the department will need to purchase a larger truck. He also updated commissioners on FEMA-related work, reporting that the bridge projects have been completed while work continues on the remaining projects.

Matt Walker and Bethany Kothman presented their weekly operations report. They reported obtaining an automated weather-monitoring tool designed to check conditions daily and provide information about upcoming weather. Walker said he is interested in seeing how the system performs during severe weather.

Walker also reported that a public hearing will be held regarding the submission of a grant application to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development program for funding assistance to purchase office information technology equipment. The hearing is scheduled for 11 a.m. Sept. 1.

Emergency Management Director Glen Briggs met with commissioners to discuss a FEMA project. Paperwork associated with the project must be completed and submitted by Sept. 2.
